ABIGAIL: LESSON TWENTY-NINE

"And Abigail came to Nabal; and, behold, he held a feast in his house, like the feast of a king; and Nabal's heart was merry within him for he was very drunken: wherefore she told him nothing, less or more, until the morning light." I Samuel 25:36

Nabal was so full of himself that he had absolutely no idea that his ill treatment of David's envoy would have repercussions. After the soldiers left, he probably had a good laugh at their expense and bragged about how he had put that upstart David in his place. He went back to the business of shearing his sheep and forgot about the men who had protected his property and asked politely for due consideration. Instead, Nabal's thoughts were on the festivities planned for later that day. He looked forward to playing the great man, entertaining his servants and neighbors in royal fashion.

Nabal was the author of his own destruction. He just didn't know it yet. Abigail was frustrated in her attempts to set him straight by his drunken condition. She would have to wait for his mind to clear if she wanted him to understand his grave mistake.

How did Abigail find herself in such a situation? The Bible doesn't give us details, but given the culture it's likely that Abigail did not choose Nabal as a mate. He was chosen for her by her parents. And we can see by her character that she was a dutiful wife endeavoring to support her husband to the best of her abilities.

Circumstances beyond our control may thrust us into situations that are difficult. We just need to remember that nothing is beyond God's control. He expects us to respond to our circumstances with the wisdom and understanding that comes from knowing His Word. And then we put feet to our faith and obey, leaving the results in His hands.
