ZAREPHATH WIDOW LESSON TEN

"And as she was going to fetch it, he called to her, and said, Bring me, I pray thee, a morsel of bread in thine hand." I Kings 17:11

No sooner had the widow begun to fetch a vessel of water for the prophet than he made a second request. He wanted a little bread to eat with his cup of water. That request definitely required the woman to go home to get some bread if she had some already made or to bake a new loaf.

And these seemingly small requests were anything but during a drought. Water was scarce. And, because crops needed water to grow, the main ingredient for the requested bread was not easy to come by. The stranger was asking a lot of this poor widow woman.
